Louisiana Landmarks Society is proud to announce their 2022 Awards for Excellence in Historic Preservation winners. The awards honor outstanding achievements in historic restoration, renovation and new design. It is a juried competition and the awards selection committee reviewed a near record-setting number of entries. Among the 14 winners this year are two residential projects, eleven commercial buildings and one institutional building.

"The pandemic put our awards on hold last year," said Sandra Stokes, former President of Louisiana Landmarks Society and Chair of the Awards Committee. "As we resume our program with renewed excitement, we are delighted to award these excellent projects and the teams that have brought them to fruition."

The 2022 Louisiana Landmarks Society Awards for Excellence in Historic Preservation were presented and celebrated at a program and reception at Hotel St. Vincent on May 10, 2022.

Hotel Saint Vincent: A New Level Of Experience



Zach Kupperman, lead developer behind the Hotel Saint Vincent, became interested in development after practicing in real estate and corporate law, representing developers and lenders. His love for creating and growing; companies, organizations, and real estate lead him to begin developing locations in New Orleans and has led him to his newest project in Aspen, Colorado.

Zach and Christina Strobel, lead developers on the Hotel Saint Vincent began the task of acquiring the project as far back as 2011. With the help of Liz Lambert and Larry McGuire, designers and managers, the hotel was acquired, and renovations began. The hotel opened its doors in June 2021, offering 75 hotel rooms, event centers, a swimming pool, 2 restaurants, 4 bars, and a boutique.

Zach was led to the property through its history and grandiosity. Historic preservation is the key to what makes New Orle-

ans an architectural paradise and is what his career has focused on, so it was the perfect project for him to take on. He was inspired by the story behind the property and the historic architecture. Hotel Saint Vincent began in Ireland in 1813 with the birth of Margaret Haughery. She was an orphan who made her way to New Orleans in 1835. With money from her bakery, she founded Saint Vincent's Infant Asylum in 1861. The developers on the project focused on restoration and preservation of the historic detail, leaving the exterior largely untouched and keeping many historic elements of the interior, including the original grand, central staircase and wide, sweeping corridors. 20^{th} century Italian elements and hints of modern opulence are layered throughout the property with mid-century and art deco furnishings, lighting, and rich materials. The developers also wanted to introduce a new concept to the city, one that did not play on the old trope of a saxophone playing musician on a French Quarter Street corner, but one that truly brought a new level of experience, design, and hospitality to the city, thus the Hotel Saint Vincent was created.

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
